## Knockout (KO) matches;

-The new so-called "XYZ" stratified pairs at regionals (if there is a Gold Rush game also offered at the same time) where there are now three strats instead of the previous two, e.g., $0-1500 / 1500-3000 / 3000+$, if the field is large enough to support the third strat;
-Ability to schedule a full seven days of gold point events at a regional, such that pair events as well as KOs can start in the afternoon and continue in the evening. Previously, because of the regulation limiting gold points events held at regionals, two one-session pair events have been held in the afternoon and evening at our District 6 (D6) and District 7 Regionals, and KOs have started in the evening and continued for three sessions the next day. You may have noticed that in the ads for the Reston, VA and Hunt Valley, MD Regionals being held in July and August of this year, respectively, you can play two sessions now of Gold Rush Pairs on the first day of the tournament. However, just because we can now start gold point events such as two-session pairs and/or KOs in the afternoon, does not mean this is what you, our players, want, so please be sure to voice your opinions on all these possibilities.

## Congratulations:

The good times rolled for many D6 players at the bridge tables as they racked up numerous high-level finishes in both NABC+ and NABC events: Beth Palmer- $5^{\text {th }}$ in NABC Machlin Women's Swiss; Gil Cohen and Marty Nelson$8^{\text {th }}$ in Silver Ribbon Pairs; Robert Brady- $9^{\text {th }}$ in the Platinum Pairs; Helene Bauman and Mickie Kivel- $15^{\text {th }}$ in the Fast Pairs, and Rebecca Duty, $16^{\text {th }}$ in the Life Master Women's Pairs. In the NAP Finals, Jian-Jian Wang and Hailong Ao were $9^{\text {th }}$ in Flight A, Mel Yudkin and Deb Dhar were $5^{\text {th }}$ in Flight B, while all three pairs representing D6 in Flight C had overall finishes. The winners of the President Cup Flight C NAP-yes, 1 st place!-were Blake Schwartzbach and Adam Gann; Terry Klein and Myron Goldstein finished $8^{\text {th }}$ and Rick Bingham and Dean Baird finished $12^{\text {th }}$, an excellent accomplishment for these new duplicate players in our District.

But this NABC clearly belonged to Sylvia Shi, who won over 200 masterpoints and garnered her first NABC+ win in the Lebhar IMP Pairs (after more than one full day of being $1^{\text {st }}$,
$2^{\text {nd }}$, and then $1^{\text {st }}$ again as score corrections and committee decisions that did not involve Sylvia and her partner swirled
around her); was $3^{\text {rd }}$ in the Life Master Women's Pairs; and with Mark Dahl, also of D6, was $15^{\mathrm{th}}$ in the Mixed Pairs. This is a noteworthy achievement, and if indicative of things to come, ensures you will be seeing her name in the winner's column again and again.

## ACBLScore+ and Other Technology Issues:

In my report following the Fall NABC in Providence, I briefly discussed the creation of a new Management Technology Committee. The three external advisors-all bridge players and eminent software developers (Greg Humphreys/ Google Chrome and Bridgewinners, Uday Ivatury/BBO, and Ralph Lipe/Microsoft)—have given freely of their time and expertise to help ACBL take a fresh look at its technology investments and to prioritize actions for the near-term. Their efforts culminated in an open Technology Forum on March 12, 2015, the final day of the BOD meetings. This Forum was attended by over 80 people, and started with several prepared statements followed by a free flowing Q\&A session. The full video, almost two hours in length, is available on Bridgewinners, and those of you who are techno-savyy are encouraged to watch it as the explanations given there are far better than what I can provide you here. At the time of the Forum, the conclusions were the following:
-Terminating ACBLScore+ was the correct decision, as the finished product was determined by the advisors to be at least 18 months from completion at the time the contract was terminated; efforts are ongoing to salvage usable portions of it.
-ACBLScore, although a workhorse for 30 years, has reached the end of its useful life and will gradually be phased out over the next 18-24 months, although a specific replacement has not yet been identified.
-The BOD Technology Oversight Committee scaled back Management's capital expenditure requests for technology for Calendar Year 2015 from $\$ 600 \mathrm{~K}$ to $\$ 130 \mathrm{~K}$ that will be spent on "modular" applications that can be used now, and then transferred to the replacement Score software. The ability to salvage some of ACBLScore+ as part of this "modular" scheme is one reason for the reduction in capital expenditures.

In addition, this year's ACBL President, Suzi Subeck, has thoroughly reviewed the ACBLScore+ contract and her comments are posted on the D6 website together with this report.

The Committee is focused on moving forward, on identifying a suitable "new" platform that can accept app-like "modules," and creating and improving "new" modular features such as ACBL

Live, K0 and Swiss start-up software, better entry fee payment processes, and the like, using the best of what ACBLScore and ACBLScore+ have to offer. The eventual goal is to replace the current ACBLscore program. In the short time since NOLA, the Committee arrived at five possible scenarios for this project, and after evaluating the alternatives, concluded that the best approach would be to build upon the ACBLscore+ framework and create a team to complete the project.

There are still challenges with some of the software that has been implemented and in addition to moving forward with new ideas, the Committee and ACBL staff are working hard to make the new software work better.

## Masterpoint Changes:

The BOD is still fine-tuning how masterpoints are awarded to make the Masterpoint awards more equitable across different kinds and ratings of events-pairs, teams, side games, regionallyrated events, and the like-there were a few small changes made this time on top of the major reworking of the Masterpoint Chart voted on at the NABC in Las Vegas last Summer and at a second unanimous reading this past Fall in Providence. Easiest to report on here is that in regionally- or sectionally-rated KOs, players on teams with more than 4 players who are otherwise eligible for overall awards will now receive a "participation" reduction: For every segment (half a match) of a match that is won and where a participant sits out, the overall awards for that individual will be reduced by $5 \%$. For example, if a player's team wins a 4 -session K0 and that participant played only half of each match, that player's masterpoint award will be reduced by $20 \%$. Similar reductions apply if a player sits out an entire match. Please see the full BOD Minutes from NOLA on the ACBL website for details on these and other motions not specifically mentioned in this report.

## Privacy Issues:

The effect of privacy issues on how local clubs and units are able to market their games and contact their players continues to be refined by ACBL. I am sure you all have noticed that any organization to which you belong and have signed up to receive emails or hard copy mailings from send you periodic notices about their privacy policy. If you have questions about what you can and cannot do, please contact your Unit President-I queried ACBL following our Charlottesville Regional to get some specific answers to sample activities in which I know many of us engage on

behalf of our units and clubs, and sent those answers to all Unit Presidents and to the rest of the D6 Board.

## Strategic Project Updates:

Several years ago, the ACBL BoD identified a number of strategic projects that we felt were critical for Management to work on over the next five years. In addition to upgrading ACBLScore, these projects include comprehensive recruitment and training of TDs, creation of an online Partnership Desk (see the article in the March 2015 ACBL Bulletin for specifics on this program-as of March 10, we already had over 10,000 hits with 1675 profiles having been created), and creation of an online bridge teaching program. We received reports on all of these projects in NOLA.

Especially here in D6 where we are facing imminent retirements on the part of our long-time directors, we need to know that there are new directors in the queue and that these new directors will be trained and capable of assuming sectional and regional Director-in-Charge (DIC) appointments. The Tournament Director University (TDU) developed last year has already had two classes of directors enrolled, one focusing on moving current directors up from working at regionals to being Regional DICs and the other on moving up sectional directors to directors capable of being Sectional DICs. Dan Plato from D7, newly appointed ACBL Manager of Recruiting and Development, has a cadre of newer directors who enter information into Tourney Trax and answer questions on rulings (with review by more experienced directors for accuracy) that are submitted to ACBL by club managers. This is just one example of hands-on experience that TDU has introduced. In addition, special customer service training is being provided to every TD, whether new or just about to retire, to ensure that standards for customer service are understood and implemented. Overseeing this effort will be the new ACBL Manager for Quality and Continuous Improvement (yet to be named). All of this will be an ongoing process and immediate results may not be achieved in all cases, but players should notice an improvement in customer service in general over the next six months. If you do not, again, please contact me or your local TC about any issues you observe.

## Other Items of Interest:

- Grass Roots Events-GNTs: A close vote
(I voted in favor) now allows free entries to the first two days of play at the Summer National Final of this event, but ONLY to


Flights A, B and C...NOT the Championship Flight. Although I almost voted against this motion due to the fact that it did not include free entries for the top flight, upon reflection I decided it would be better to at least get the other three flights' free entries in the regulations and hope to include the Championship Flight at a later date.

- Grass Roots FUNd: Immediately following passage of the above motion, another motion was discussed and amended to state that all of the Grass Roots FUNds raised by each district that are currently collected by ACBL and then returned in their entirety to each district, would be "taxed" by the amount of $20 \%$ of the total and the now free entries for the three lowest flights of the GNTs taken out of that and then the remaining monies distributed to districts based on their success in raising per-member Grass Roots FUNds. Mostly through the regionally rated games at sectionals, D6 has been working very hard to increase its rev-
enues, and our efforts should be protected because our per-member FUNd-raising is continually increasing. But, it remains to be seen if the actual monies returned to D6 will be commensurate with our efforts-stay tuned as I fully expect this continuing saga to be again refined.
- Changes to the General Convention Chart: Two competitive bidding additions to the General Convention Chart were passed-transfer responses after overcalls where the call shows length or values in the suit of the transfer, and a direct overcall of 2 diamonds to show a one-suited hand in hearts or spades over natural notrump bids or overcalls are now both allowed.
- Email blasts: Many of us currently take advantage of the email blasts that ACBL will, at our request, send out to targeted audiences for our sectionals and regionals. A new contract will soon be in place that will allow each unit and club more

flexibility in the number of emails it can send to market special events. More information will follow directly from Headquarters in the near future.

- Conduct and Ethics violations: Notices of decisions made by Unit, District or ACBL level disciplinary committees, and by the Ethical Oversight Committee are routinely sent to concerned parties, club managers, and all BOD members when Members are placed on probation, suspended, or expelled. In NOLA, a regulation was passed that the names of Members receiving probation or suspended will now be published on the ACBL website, and expulsions will be published on the ACBL website and reported in the ACBL Bulletin. It is hoped that publication of these decisions will increase player awareness of the severity of conduct and ethical infractions and help serve as a further deterrent to such behavior.
- ACBL Presidential visit: Suzi Subeck of District 13 (Chicago), ACBL President for 2015, attended the Richmond Regional over Memorial Day weekend. There were several opportunities for players to interact directly with Suzi and ask questions concerning aspects of ACBL that were of interest to them, including ACBLScore+, ACBL funding of NABCs, ACBL marketing efforts to attract new players, and others.

overcall and no cooperative interest. Redouble is interesting; it might be best suited for a game try in spades so that there is not wastage there.
Jill Meyers- $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ a is the worst hand; bids show extras.
Adam Wildavsky-I try to always ask a new partner before we play, and I put the answer on our convention card. Most popular is surely that a return to suit is the weakest hand. Other possibilities are that pass is weakest, in which case a rebid of my suit shows extra offense but not extra high card values, or that a pass is weakest below game and a return to suit is weakest at or above game.

Billy Pollack- $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ is weak, but OK trumps, redouble = extras, usually with defense.

Jeff Rubens-Assuming that $2 \boldsymbol{v}$ is a general force (not necessarily a fit), pass is forcing, hence ambiguous, potentially nothing special to say; redouble is strength-showing, creates a force; $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ shows good spade suit, strong indication of strain choice, but not enough extra values to raise the level.

Ron Smith—Pass shows interest, redouble shows strength with no clear direction and $2 \boldsymbol{A}=$ the worst hand.

Two experts have to worry about four-card overcalls.

Bobby Wolff- These are good and necessary questions for any aspiring partnership to differentiate. Pass can be the worst hand, unless your next bid contradicts that meaning. Redouble shows a good hand, likely defense but promises another bid (e.g. LHO bids $3 \bullet$ passed around) if still under game and in the passout seat. 2A, while weak and very passable, would show at least five since the overcall could be on a fourcard suit. I could hold $\uparrow A Q J x \vee x x \diamond K 10 x x x * x x$, but not $\uparrow A Q J x \vee x \times A Q J x x * x x$ where I'd bid $3 *$ as soon as possible. With $\uparrow A Q J x \vee x x$ KQ10xx \&xx, I would pass and then bid $3 \bullet$ over a then $2 \boldsymbol{A}$-bid by partner, and that then would become passable. I slightly prefer overcalling $1 \wedge$ to $2 \star$, but would not consider passing immediately.

Marty Bergen- Pass is a decent hand with five+ spades, $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$ is the weakest action, and redouble is a four-card spade suit with a decent hand.

Steve Garner-Redouble is best hand showing a full opener; pass is medium; $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ is worst.

Danny Gerstman-2 $\uparrow$ is the worst hand; pass shows some game interest; redouble says it is our hand, willing to defend if they bid.

Larry Cohen-For the most part, I play fast arrival in all of these situations. Return to the trump suit is weakest.

Mike Lawrence-I like pass to imply a fourcard suit and a good hand or a bad hand with five spades. $2 \uparrow$ is a playing minimum hand you rather like. Redouble is all better hands.

Barry Rigal-Return to trumps weakest. Pass is game try. Redouble undefined

Henry Bethe-I have never discussed this. General principles would say that $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ shows no interest in game, pass shows some interest, and redouble shows a heart control and interest.

Richie Schwartz-2 $\boldsymbol{A}$ is weak, no interest. Pass is decent hand. Redouble is maximum and a heart control

Chuck Berger--Pass is game interest, redouble is game-forcing values plus a heart control. $2 \wedge$ is weak.

Jon Wittes-I play pass shows nothing extra for my bidding. Rebidding my suit probably shows extra length, but not significant extra values. Redouble should show extra values, and gives partner room to further describe their hand.

Albert Siebert-Bid of our suit is weak, pass equals some interest or better, redouble is some interest but possible three losers in their suit.

Venkatrao Koneru-I play if you race to the level you're forced to, then that is your weakest bid. Thus, $2 \boldsymbol{a}$ indicates a minimum with no higher ambitions. I play pass typically shows some interest especially when there are no in-between steps as here. As redouble takes away partner's ability to redouble with his own slight extras, I think it shows slightly more than pass. There if you had a good hand, you could venture to the three-level to make a semi-natural game try.

Marinesa Letizia-Pass is forward going, redouble is a really good hand. $2 \boldsymbol{A}$ is a minimum.

Carol Simon-I have the agreement with my partner that the immediate $2 \boldsymbol{a}$ bid shows no interest in pursuing a game and is the weakest action of the three choices. Pass shows game invitational values, but not the type of hand to make a help suit game try, nor does it show shortness in hearts. Redouble is a game try with shortness in hearts.

John Mohan-I think that after an overcall, pass is the worst hand, a return to suit
shows a minimum but a good suit, and redouble is a non-minimum.

Bart Bramley-Retreating to our suit is the weakest bid, and pass is more encouraging. Redouble shows strength. In the specific case of our Drury $2 *$ getting doubled we play something special: two of our suit is weak with five (or more), and pass shows only four of our suit.

Three experts play that pass is the weakest action.

Bobby Lipsitz—Pass is the weakest hand; $2 \uparrow$ confirms a "real" overcall; and a redouble is the strongest hand, possible penalty-oriented.

Steve Bloom-For us, pass is always the weakest option. May not be best for all auctions, but it is a simple rule. Redouble always shows a control and extra values. It might be an attempt to get to notrump from partner's side.

Joe Kivel—Pass is the weakest bid. $2 \uparrow$ shows typically an extra spade, and invites partner to compete. Redouble shows defensive strength.

## Auction two

What do pass, redouble and $3 \vee$ show?
Partner's $3 \diamond$ shows a limit raise or better in hearts. Most experts agree with me and like returning to $3 \vee$ to reject partner's game try. Pass shows some extras and allows partner to sign-off in $3 \boldsymbol{v}$ to show a bad limit raise. However, the meaning of redouble is split. I think that since this could be a slam auction and $3 \bullet$ does not promise a control, redouble should be slammish and promise a diamond control.

Joe Kivel—Pass is the weakest bid. 3shows an extra heart or a second suit. Redouble shows defensive strength.

George Jacobs- $3 \boldsymbol{v}$ is an attempt to sign off, pass is game interest and redouble is a control.

Ralph Katz—Pass is a game try. Redouble shows a good balanced hand, and sets up a forcing pass. $3 \bullet$ is a signoff.

Kit Woolsey-Pass shows game interest and redouble is a cuebid.

Larry Mori-Pass shows more interest and $3 \vee$ shows no cooperative interest. Here, for consistency, redouble can be used the same way but the opponent's action tells you this is a wasted bid. It is better to show a control such that having reduced to a 30-point deck, we are better

Jill Meyers-Bidding 3v shows a minimum opener, redouble shows first round control of diamonds, and pass is slam interest but nothing further to say.

Second round control would be great to show also.

Adam Wildavsky-Return to $3 \boldsymbol{\square}$ is the weakest hand.

Billy Pollack—3 $\boldsymbol{\bullet}$ is weak, but OK trumps; redouble = extras, usually with defense.

Jeff Rubens-I dislike that use of $3 \star$, so I never developed a theory for this kind of situation. I would guess that without discussion partner would expect $3 \bullet$ to decline the game-try so it is non-forcing. A pass leaves the question open and perhaps conceals a slam-try, but only if partner now shows extras. Redouble is game-forcing.

Ron Smith—Pass is game interest. Redouble could have a penalty aspect, but is a good hand; bidding $3 \vee$ shows a minimum opener.

The following expert has to worry about having only four hearts.

Bobby Wolff- Pass is likely to be the minimum opener unless later contradicted, usually because of being only a four-card suit and waiting to hear support from partner and then continuing with another suit (good enough hand but only a four-card suit opening bid). Redouble would show good defense and a promise not to pass, if later action occurred. In other words, if over your redouble West bids $4 \diamond$ or $5 \star$, the redoubler is forced to act so that the redoubler's partner can pass with assurance. $3 \backsim$ would be a minimum opener and passable, but at least five cards in the suit (sometimes even while playing five-card majors I prefer opening $1 \vee$ with $\uparrow x \cup$ AKQ10 $Q x \& J 10 x x x$ to which I would then pass and continue to pass or correct later).

Steve Garner-Redouble shows a full opener; pass shows a medium hand; a $3 \bullet$ bid shows a minimum hand.

Danny Gerstman- $3 \boldsymbol{\bullet}$ is a minimum hand; pass shows some game interest. Redouble says it is our hand, willing to defend if they bid but less likely to defend as they now have a known fit.

David Berkowitz- $3 \bullet$ is a minimum hand, pass shows some game interest and redouble is a balanced hand with extras.

Larry Cohen-3v is weakest bid.

Mike Lawrence-I despise limit or better on this sequence. When RHO bids something, opener has issues. Prefer old fashioned limit raises here with a cuebid being game forcing, probably balanced. Pass is encouraging. $3 \downarrow$ is worst. Redouble is a control with a good hand.

Barry Rigal- $3 \bullet$ is weakest bid. Pass is a game try. Redouble is undefined.

Henry Bethe-General principles would say that $3 \vee$ shows no interest in game, pass shows some interest, and redouble shows a diamond control and interest.

Richey Schwartz- $3 \vee$ is a minimum hand, no game interest. Pass is a decent hand. Redouble is a maximum opener with a diamond control.

Chuck Berger-Pass is a waiting bid, with a good or bad hand. Redouble is game-forcing with a control. $3 \bullet$ is a weakish weak two bid.

Jon Wittes—Pass shows nothing extra for my bidding. Rebidding my suit probably shows extra length, but not significant extra values. Redouble shows extra values and should be a game try similar to a maximal overcall double.

Albert Siebert-3 bid is weak; pass equals some game interest or better; and redouble is some game interest but possible two losers in their suit.

Venkatrao Koneru-3v indicates a minimum hand with no higher ambitions. I think redouble is the strongest game try available and pass is a milder suggestion. In this case you have no other bids without committing to game.

Marinesa Letizia-Pass is encouraging, redouble shows first or second round diamond control and $3 \bullet$ is a minimum not accepting a limit raise.

Carol Simon-3 $\boldsymbol{\bullet}$ shows that I wish to play there opposite a limit raise. Pass invites partner to take clarifying action and confirms game acceptance of a limit raise. Since there is no room left for a game try, redouble would have to be 'last train' and must include numerous hand types including short diamonds.

Bart Bramley-Retreating to $3 \checkmark$ is the weakest bid, and pass is more encouraging. Redouble shows strength.

Marty Bergen-3v is the weakest bid. Pass is decent, and redouble is $0-1$ diamond, not game-forcing.

John Mohan-Pass is a minimum hand, return to the suit shows a minimum but a good suit, and redouble is non-minimum.

Bobby Lipsitz-Pass is a minimum hand; $3 \vee$ confirms an opener without extras; redouble $=$ diamond control slam try.

Steve Bloom-Pass is always the weakest option. Redouble shows a control and extra values. It might be an attempt to get to notrump from partner's side. The return to our suit is also weak, so non-forcing after a limit raise, but somewhat forward going - think of that as a last train try.

## Auction three

What do $4 \bullet$, redouble and pass show over the double?

Partner's 4* bid shows at least four hearts, short diamonds and game-forcing val-
 $4 \diamond$-splinter. Most of the experts play that bidding $4 \bullet$ over the double is the weakest action. The only question is what does redouble show.

George Jacobs- $4 \vee$ is to play, pass is slam interest, and redouble is first round control.

Ralph Katz-4 $\downarrow$ is a signoff, pass is a slam try and redouble is a slam try with the ace of diamonds.

Kit Woolsey-Rebidding $4 \bullet$ is the worst. Pass shows slam interest and redouble is a cuebid.

Larry Mori-4 shows no slam interest. Redouble shows first round control of diamonds, and pass shows interest to let partner redouble with a first-round control.

Jill Meyers-4『 is a minimum opener. Redouble shows first round control of diamonds, and pass is slam interest but nothing further to say.

Adam Wildavsky-The redouble of a splinter should show extras plus the $\quad$ A, so partner knows how to value a void.

Billy Pollack-4 $\boldsymbol{\bullet}$ is a minimum opener. Redouble is extras, slam-going. Pass is in between the two.

Jeff Rubens-I have treated this situation differently with different partners. Some preferred $4 \vee$ to show extra values but not enough to bid over game, but it was more popular to use $4 \vee$ to show no interest in bidding higher. Pass has a matching meaning. Redouble was widely seen as first-round diamond control.

Ron Smith-4 $\boldsymbol{v}$ is a signoff, redouble shows the $\quad$ A and looking for more, and pass shows interest in slam but not first round control of diamonds.

Bobby Wolff- $4 \boldsymbol{\rightharpoonup}$ is of course a minimum opener and very passable. Redouble is always first round control of diamonds. Pass denies first round control but is obviously forcing, and no doubt denies a minimum. It doesn't guarantee a great hand, perhaps: $\uparrow A x \vee A Q x x>x x$ $\because K J 10 x$, down to $\uparrow K x \vee A J 10 x x * x x * A Q x$. With $\uparrow A \bullet A J X x x \bullet x x * A Q x x$, I would bid $4 \uparrow$, and with $\uparrow x \vee A Q x x \bullet x x x * A K J x$, I would instead bid $5 \%$. Partner, upon hearing those cuebids, should then appreciate the vast difference between a void in the opponent's suit and only a singleton, since I did not redouble. Your subject becomes critical for relatively new partnerships to discuss, since a partnership is very likely to have different views, or in many cases, one partner wants to have clear understandings, and the other only hopes to guess right when necessary, but in actuality, does not figure to be that lucky.

Steve Garner-Pass is willingness to compete if they save; redouble is slam interest; $4 \bullet$ is a minimum opener.

Danny Gerstman- $4 \boldsymbol{\bullet}$ is to play; pass interest*; redouble is first round diamond control and is not a drive beyond game. With that hand would have bid it, or will do so after other hand signs off in $4 \bullet$.

David Berkowitz-4 $\downarrow$ is the weakest bid, redouble is first round control with slam interest, and pass is no first round control, but still slam interest.

Larry Cohen-For the most part, I play fast arrival in all of these situations. Return to the trump suit is weakest.

Mike Lawrence-Pass is encouraging. 4 $\downarrow$ is a minimum hand. Redouble is slammish with no indication of your diamond holding.

Barry Rigal-Return to $4 \bullet$ is weakest.
Henry Bethe-4v is no slam interest. Pass is slam interest, and redouble is interest with the $A$.

Richey Schwartz-Over a splinter bid, redouble is first round control.

Chuck Berger-4 $\downarrow$ is freeze out. Redouble is first round diamond control and slam interest. Pass is waiting, good or bad.

Albert Siebert-4 4 is no slam interest, and redouble is a mandatory control bid. Pass shows some slam interest.

Bobby Lipsitz-4 $\downarrow$ is sign off; pass looking for cooperation; redouble strongest.

Marinesa Letizia-4 $\bullet$ shows no diamond control and no slam interest. Redouble shows first round control, and pass denies a diamond control, but shows slam interest.

Carol Simon- $4 \bullet$ is weakest action and shows negative slam interest. Redouble shows a first round control. Pass shows slam interest and is probably looking for a spade or club cuebid with an appropriate hand.

John Mohan—Redouble first with slam interest, pass otherwise with slam interest and, if room, a cuebid below game is a direct slam move.

Bart Bramley-In all cases retreating to our suit is the weakest bid, and pass is more encouraging. Redouble shows strength, but redouble of a splinter-double shows the ace of that suit.

Marty Bergen-4v is weakest action. Pass is slam interest. Redouble is a slam try with a bad suit.

Steve Bloom-Pass is always the weakest option. May not be best for all auctions, but it is a simple rule. Redouble always shows a control, and extra values.

Joe Kivel-Pass is the weakest (least interest) response. $4 \vee$ shows extra length or extra strength, but is certainly not forcing. l've always played that redouble showed the ace, but perhaps it makes sense to just play it shows strong slam interest.

Jon Wittes-Pass shows nothing extra for my bidding. Redouble should show first round control, and be a slam try.

In auction one, I like 2^ to show a minimum with six spades, and pass to show a minimum with four or five spades. Redouble shows a hand that is not good enough to bid higher than 2a but not a sub-minimum...11-12 points for instance. Redouble could also be a very good hand depending on what follows. In auction two, I like 3• to show no game interest, pass to show some interest without a control and redouble to show interest with a control. Passing allows responder to bid $3 \bullet$ with a minimum and redouble with a control. Redouble allows responder to bid $3 \vee$ with a minimum. In auction three, $4 \bullet$ shows a minimum, pass shows extras and redouble shows first-round control.
